


The Central Arctic Ocean A case for a 10 year Moratorium

Transpolar Shipping Route (TSR)- because we can doesn't mean we should.....

- Cutting across the North Pole near the Bering Strait potentially reducing journey time between North America/Northern Europe and East Asia by 3-13 days.
- Some associated economic benefits but high risk and there are alternatives
- Currently inaccessible due to frozen conditions A TSR would require rapidly melting ice and/or icebreaking
- Significant impacts of shipping in a unique and vulnerable region biodiversity loss and disturbance from underwater noise, graywater discharge and black carbon
- Additionally TSR would only result in emissions reductions of about 24% in 1/25000 vessels

A 10yr Moratorium on exploitation of CAO High Seas

We need to protect what we can of the ice and the this unique biome with a precautionary principle pause

Restrict: commercial tourism, fishing, nuclear testing, radioactive waste dumping, seismic surveys, oil and gas exploration, deep sea mining, and transpolar shipping.

Benefits of a 10yr pause on exploitation of the CAO

- The CAO Arctic Ice is vital to climate regulation and is a particularly vulnerable ecosystem which is irrecoverable in our lifetime once lost
- Ice loss there amplifies ocean warming and acidification, sea level rise, ocean current and atmospheric current disruption globally affecting
- It is an alarm system for keeping States incentivised to keep under 1.5 degrees
- Fosters international cooperation in an area beyond national jurisdiction
- Low-tech pre-emptive solution to protect the existing ecosystem before it is damaged
- Gives scientists time to discover more about this little known region and for legal instruments like the High Seas Treaty time to come into force
- The CAO is an Area Beyond National Jurisdiction A Global Commons where the climate just response is to take into account broader voices of those most affected including indigenous communities, LDC's and Small Island States
